State Program Manager:

- seek projects
- advises on competitiveness
- scores projects
- presents to Governors or Governor's Alternates for final vote.

BEA:

- first point of connection for many
- sorts projects towards eligible funding
- facilitates the application process
- hosts technical assistance
- aligns NBRC projects with state strategy

Quick Overview

Northern Border Regional Commission

- One of 8 Regional Commissions in the US
- Focused on rural economic development
- Conducted through three grant programs with distinct timelines, uses, and processes:
 - Catalyst
 - Forest Economy Program
 - Timber for Transit
- Projects involve a discrete start, stop, and outputs
- Competitive projects align with NBRC, state, regional strategies

Process Flow

- Pre-application technical assistance
- Pre-application: validates eligibility and alignment, not competitiveness
- Full application: evaluates competitiveness, voted on for award
- From award, obligation of federal funds
 - Officially labels the monies as "for your project"
 - LDD expenses can be backdated to this date
- One year to obtain a Notice to Proceed (NTP)

Process Flow

- From NTP, three-year execution period
 - Project match can now be expended alongside project funds
 - Match is "due" at the same time as reimbursement requests
 - Quarterly and annual reporting: project & financial
 - Reimbursement requests (proportional match included per request)

Timeline

Spring 2025:

- Pre-application deadline: 5 pm, March 7th
- Application deadline (by invitation): 5pm, April 18th
- NBRC Meeting: early June
- Notice of awards & unsuccessful applications: by June 27th

Fall 2025:

- Pre-application deadline: 5 pm, August 29th
- Application deadline (by invitation): 5pm, October 10th
- NBRC Meeting: December
- Notice of awards & unsuccessful applications: December



Where to Start

- Validate entity, location, and project eligibility
- Develop your project concept, attend or watch recorded trainings from NBRC, attend this orientation
 - A good rule of thumb: use the questionnaire on the state technical assistance website as a guidepost for: <u>www.nbrc-nh.com</u>

- Why use the technical assistance page?
 - Helps us track your project and send you updates

Economic Development Projects

Economic Development 101


- Economic Development =/= antipoverty programs
 - Antipoverty work is generally focused on alleviating the symptoms of economic distress for individuals
- Economic development is...
 - The development of capacities that expand economic actors' capabilities. (Individuals, firms, or industries)
 - More money in more pockets over time, or the improvement of systems to do so.
 - Note the Key Performance Indicators (KPIs):
 - Businesses, jobs, costs, private investment, etc

Projects 101

- A planned series of efforts to result in predetermined outcomes
- Projects have a discrete start and stop, with concrete outputs
- A logic model is a useful tool to organize efforts in this way
- The planned activities should link together and culminate in the outcome
- Budget line items should relate to and support planned activities
- Notice of Federal Interest for infrastructure.

Logic Model

- Plan backwards, implement forward
- Initial conditions: situation, priorities, assumptions, externalities
- Inputs -> Activities -> Outputs -> Outcomes -> Impact
- Impact is post-project analysis and beyond the scope of a grant


NBRC Eligibility and Competitiveness

Eligible Entities

- State & local govt
- Planning commissions & other authorities
- 501c organizations
- Federally-recognized tribes

Eligible Areas

- Coös, Sullivan, Cheshire, Belknap, Carroll, Merrimack, Parts of Grafton
- Ineligible: Strafford, Rockingham, Hillsborough



Funding Split	Counties
20% local match	Coös, Sullivan
50% local match	Merrimack, Belknap, Carroll, Cheshire, Parts of Grafton

Funding Priorities Overview

Catalyst Program

Catalyst Infrastructure

- Up to \$1 million per project
- Transportation
- Basic Public Infrastructure
 - Water & Wastewater, Solid Waste, Heat Generation Systems, Outdoor Recreation, Public Meeting Spaces, Childcare or Basic Healthcare Facilities
- Telecommunications
- Renewable & Alternative Energy
- Higher maximum criteria (2+ areas, 2+ types)

Catalyst: an agent that provokes or speeds significant change or action

Catalyst Program

Catalyst Non-Infrastructure

- Up to \$500k per project
- Workforce Development (immediately hirable skills or pipelines)
- Business Development
- Basic Health Care
- Resource Conservation, Tourism & Recreation

Forest Economy Program

- Up to \$1 million per project
- Community Development
- Workforce Training & Development
- Business Planning & Technical Assistance
- Marketing, Communication & Education
- Infrastructure in Direct Support of Forest Economy
 - Transportation
 - Basic Public Infrastructure
 - Telecommunications
 - Renewable & Alternative Energy

Timber for Transit

- Up to \$5 million per project
- Using advanced wood products in transportation infrastructure
- Three categories
 - Feasibility
 - Implementation
 - Feasibility & Implementation

Scoring Criteria

- Alignment with priorities
- Project readiness
- Clearly articulated economic development benefits
- Leveraging local and regional resources/assets
- Community buy-in
- Articulates need for NBRC funding
- Other criteria available in User Manual appendices

Readiness & Competitiveness

- A project would be considered "Ready" when:
 - Planned activities with definite outputs
 - Budget logically links to activities
 - Fits one or more NBRC funding priorities
 - Data demonstrates funding priority alignment
- Competitive when:
 - Aligns with two or more of state, local, regional, or NBRC plans
 - Scores well in reference to the program scoring criteria
 - Articulates local support and funding need
 - Organizational capacity to implement

Document Checklist: Application

Documents grantees are required to complete and upload to the GMS:

- Authorized Official Resolution
- <u>SF-424cbw</u> Grant Application Detailed Budget Worksheet
- Current Certificate of Good Standing (Non-Profit Organizations)
- IRS Determination Letter (Required for Non-Profit Organizations)
- Indirect Cost Rate Documentation (if applicable)
- Revolving Fund Loan Documentation (if applicable)
- Waivers (if applicable): 75% Expenditure, Significant Benefit, LDD

Ongoing Best Practices

Application process

- Get technical assistance: www.nbrc-nh.com
 - Historically, technical assistance correlates with successful awards
- Talk to the State Program Manager
- Only 3-5 letters of support, no boilerplate

Post-Award:

- Keep all parties in the loop
- Deviate from scope only with permission
- Use appropriate forms and procedures



Working with the NBRC

- The NBRC is a federal entity, which means they operate through:
 - Rules: read the User Manuals and understand them.
 - Documents: there's (most likely) a form for that...
 - Processes: rules and documents reinforce process
 - Especially with project changes, do not "ask for forgiveness
 later", it may leave you in a bad spot unable to reimburse people

Working with the NBRC

- Applicant Authorized Official: your responsibility to stay in communication
 - When in doubt, ping <admin@nbrc.gov>
 - Clear, concise communication, cite user manuals when possible
 - Accurately describe current conditions and the request
 - Subject and first few lines should let them quickly sort your email to the most appropriate person
 - Post-Award, include your grant number

Post-Award Document Checklist

- To obtain Federal Obligation of Funds (by NBRC)
 - Review Award Letter Review and Complete any noted missing or incomplete material from your application.
 - Execute and Upload to GMS
 - Grant Award Acknowledgement Form (Found at the end of Award Letter)
 - SF3881 ACH Form

Post-Award Document Checklist

- To obtain a Partial Notice to Proceed (PNTP), which authorizes grant funds to be used for LDD assistance (up to 1% of formula) and tasks associated to complete NEPA including environmental consultants as approved by NBRC (scope, budget, timeline)
 - Attendance of mandatory new grantee training sessions
 - LDD Contract
 - Grant Agreement review, signed, uploaded
 - NEPA Intake Form (Level of review is determined by NBRC ER Consultant, dependent on scope 6 to 12+ months)
- To obtain a Full Notice to Proceed (FNTP)
 - Documentation of NEPA Satisfaction (NBRC ER Consultant)
 - Documentation of match/cost share (Form 1002 & support)

Post-Award Compliance

- Items such as state and local permitting, Select Board approval, etc
- NBRC Grant Administration & Compliance Manual
- National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA)
- Build America, Buy America Act (BABAA)
- Standard Forms
 - Competitive Bidding vs Sole Sourcing (talk to NBRC before obligating funds)
 - Project reports, financial reports, and reimbursement requests
 - Amendments to the grant agreement
 - Authorized Official and updating contacts
